


BAY to BIRDWOOD

OVERVIEW

The Bay to Birdwood is one of the world's great historic motoring events and is a standout fixture on South Australia's cultural events calendar.

Tens of thousands of spectators line the 67 kilometre route to view the passing parade of historic motoring from West Beach through to the National Motor Museum at Birdwood in the Adelaide Hills.

Held annually, the Bay to Birdwood is a motoring event that brings participants from around Australia and the world to celebrate all things historic motoring.

Other measures in progress include the development of a sustainability statement, the implementation of a carbon offset, partnering with eco-friendly vendors, and improving waste and recycling processes.

Bay to Birdwood will remain a celebration of historic motoring in all its forms and will continue to embrace ICE vehicle entrants. Taking these steps towards carbon neutrality will ensure future generations can enjoy the event as people have been doing for the past 42 years.



The EV Conversion, Concours d'Elegance, and Preservation Awards will be judged at a exclusive pre-judging event the day prior to the parade in the Courtyard Precinct of the Migration Museum, State Library of South Australia, and South Australian Museum.

As an EV Conversion Award entrant, your vehicle must be presented in a suitable condition and comply with the Bay to Birdwood regulations.

In 2022, over **500** enthusiasts gathered at the North Terrace Cultural Precinct to witness the meticulous judging process and enjoy the festive mood of the occasion.



Bay to Birdwood switches power on

The world's most iconic motoring event, Bay to Birdwood, is powering up for another year – literally.

A n electric vehicle category will be added to Bay to Birdwood this year. Vintage vehicles converted to electric will join the 67km route from West Beach to Birdwood in the Adelaide Hills for the first time on 16 October. Previously, vehicles eligible to enter were only permitted to be slightly modified.

Organisers define an electric modified historic vehicle as one built prior to 1993 that has been converted from an original internal combustion engine and drivetrain to an electric drivetrain and power source. Pictured above is a 1973 Land Rover Series III electric vehicle, worth about \$260,000.

According to Bay to Birdwood Chair Michael Neale, the decision to add an EV category to the run is a way to "celebrate the history of motoring as a whole".

"Many people around the world, and throughout Australia, are currently undertaking EV conversions of their historic vehicles. It is a growing part of the history of motoring," Mr Neale says.

"Taking leadership towards carbon neutrality ensures future generations will be able to enjoy the event."

Bay to Birdwood Barina sparks new interest

An electric vehicle (EV) category has been added to Bay to Birdwood this year – and Eric Rodda's vintage 1985 Holden Barina MB will be one of the entrants on show.

For the first time vintage vehicles converted to electric will join the 67km ride from West Beach to Birdwood in the Adelaide Hills for the first time on Sunday, 16 October. Previously, vehicles eligible to enter were only permitted to be slightly modified.

The Barina was converted to an EV by Eric – a retired electronics technician – a dozen years ago but the converted car will be one of three to debut at the rally in the new category.

"I met some fellas in Goolwa who had converted a car and I took it for a drive and decided to give it a go as a bit of a hobby," Eric, 70, said.

"I bought the Barina in 2008 because it was light and had room for a battery in the back and I finished the conversion by 2010.

"I've been turning heads in car parks ever since – just the other day a fella drove past me in a Tesla and asked me what car is that?"

Eric is passionate about EVs – he's the secretary of the SA & NT Branch of the Australian Electric Vehicle Association – and is excited to take part in this year's rally.

"A dozen years ago there were hardly any EVs around but in the next 12 years I reckon they will be coming into the country like crazy" the Marion resident said.

[BACK ON THE ROAD - THE BAY TO BIRDWOOD RETURNS FOR 2022]

On **Sunday 16 October** a parade of more than 1500 historic vehicles will set out from Barratt Reserve at West Beach and make its way up to the Adelaide Hills and gather at National Motor Museum in Birdwood.

Michael Neale, Chair of the Bay to Birdwood, says ‘tens of thousands will gather along the route and at the Museum to celebrate the full return of the Bay to Birdwood – it’s all back, the crowds, the fashion and the festivities. After the heartbreak of cancelling last year, it is a thrill to again welcome participants from around Australia to one of the world’s great historic motoring events.’

‘The 2022 Bay to Birdwood features a wide array of vehicles that span the breadth of the 20th century, including - antique, veteran, vintage and post-war/early classic, classic, post-classic and modern. The vehicles this year include a very unique 1909 Stanley Steamer (one of only three of this type left in the world’.

‘One of the great pleasures of the event is that it sees both first time participants and multi-year veterans of the event taking part. It celebrates vehicles that have stayed within a single family, those that are barn finds, and those competing in the *Concours d’Elegance* and Preservation Awards. And this year, we welcome for the very first time, EV converted historic vehicles to the Bay to Birdwood. ’ said the Chair. “There really is only one Bay to Birdwood – and this is it!”

The parade participants gather at the National Motor Museum in Birdwood for the Finish Festival, which is a ticketed event that opens at 10 am and features food, fashions, fun, wine, coffee and craft beer. At the Festival audiences enjoy a picnic on the grounds, food trucks catering and mingle with the 1500 plus vehicles, watch the awards presentation and the colourful Fashions in the Field.
